## DEGENERATIVE MYELOPATHY

Consider the opportunity to block a devastating disease from our breed with a noninvasive and relatively inexpensive test. While Degenerative Myelopathy is not, at present, a major problem in Bloodhounds, acting now can prevent breeding dogs who suffer from the disease.

DM is a progressive disease which begins with the spinal cord in the chest area, causing progressive weakness or paralysis of the hind limbs. Dogs which exhibit DM wobble while walking and knuckle over or drag their feet. As the disease advances, the dog may buckle at the knees and have difficulty standing, ultimately becoming unable to walk and losing continence and use of the front limbs. This is terrible outcome for the golden years of our beloved companions and their caregivers. Affected dogs may experience extreme debilitation but no pain, and some affected dogs have no symptoms but are carriers.

The onset is typically 9-11 years of age, some not until 15 . By the time symptoms appear, the dog may well have been bred several times.

DM mimics symptoms of herniated discs, spinal cord infections, tumors, cysts, injuries, strokes, and arthritis, all of which may be treatable. According to the University of Missouri website, "There have been no treatments that have been clearly shown to stop or slow the progression of DM." The human equivalent is Lou Gehrig's disease (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis).

Definitive diagnosis of DM is based on examination of the spinal cord under a microscope when a necropsy is performed, but we can determine the status of living dogs with a cheek swab or a blood sample. These enable identification of the dog as clear, carriers, or affected. Both male and female breeding stock must be tested. Affected dogs should not be bred, and carriers should be bred only to dogs that have tested clear. Clear dogs may be bred to one another or to carriers. Of course, breeding decisions must be based on considerations of all the dog's strengths and all the dog's faults, of which DM testing results are one factor among many.

DM is caused by a mutated gene. As of May 19, 2009, researchers have found the mutation present in over 75 breeds, as well as mixed breed dogs. Through October 14, 2009, 41 Bloodhounds have been
tested: 23 tested NORMAL, 15 tested CARRIER, and 3 tested AFFECTED/AT RISK. The number of carriers and affected dogs found in this relatively small sample suggests this mutation could be fairly widespread in the breed.

For a description of blood sample and cheek swab tests, go to the CHIC DNA Repository website (www.caninehealthinfo.org). Blood sample: "Blood is the gold standard for genetic material; the yield of DNA is sufficient for all research methods, including technologies on the horizon. The drawback of banking blood samples is cost-drawing, shipping, storing, and extracting DNA from blood are more expensive endeavors than the alternative." Cheek swab: Cheek swab-derived DNA is inferior to that obtained from blood, but the material is suitable for most genetic approaches. The swabs are inexpensive (\$65), and the samples can be taken by the owner of the dog and shipped inexpensively. If you have dogs tested through OFA/CHIC for DM or epilepsy, you should give permission to share your information with the University of Missouri for further research.

By testing your Bloodhound, you will not only determine the status of your breeding stock, but also contribute to valuable ongoing research. You can obtain more information, an application for the DNA Repository, and submission kits from www.caninegeneticdiseases.net/DM/maindm.htm and www.caninehealthinfo.org.

The DM test is available for any breed, and is specifically recommended for American Eskimo Dogs, Bernese Mountain Dog, Boxers, Cardigan Welsh Corgis, Chesapeake Bay Retrievers, German Shepherd Dogs, Golden Retrievers, Great Pyrenees, Kerry Blue Terriers, Pembroke Welsh Corgis, Poodles, Pugs, Rhodesian Ridgebacks, Shetland Sheepdogs, Soft Coated Wheaten Terriers, and Wire Fox Terriers.
