

This year's parade is same format as last year's:

- 1. Date is the Monday after Thanksgiving Weekend November 28, 2011
- 2. Line-up on Cameron Street between Cork and Piccadilly streets
- 3. Route starts at Piccadilly to Braddock to Cork and ends at intersection of Cork and Loudoun
- 4. Reserved parking for school buses on north Cameron Street all other participants need to park in public parking areas, garages or lots
- 5. Tree lighting event to immediately follow parade.
- 6. The start time is at 7:00pm it was 6:30pm previously to help alleviate the congestion between the timing of downtown workers leaving their offices and parade participants arriving for lineup. Parade expected to end at 8:00pm
  - 7. Line-up begins at 6:15 pm.

# TRICKY TREATS FOR DOGS

Makes 14 treats

2 cups water

3/4 cup canned applesauce

1/8 teaspoon vanilla

1 egg

3 cups whole-wheat flour

1 cup white flour

1/4 cup chopped nuts

1 tablespoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 cup oats

- · Preheat oven to 350 F.
- In a bowl, mix water, applesauce, vanilla and egg thoroughly.
- In a separate blow, combine flour, nuts, baking powder, nutmeg, and cinnamon, stirring well.
  - Add wet ingredients to dry and mix well.
- Spoon into greased muffin tins, filling each cup completely and bake for about 1 1/4 hours.
   Cool completely and store in a sealed container.



# How to Protect Your Dog on Halloween

Halloween is the time of year that a lot of people like to do pranks-egg throwing, toilet paper and stink bombs in the mailbox are all popular things to do on this night-which is why it is very important to make sure your dog is protected. Here are some ways.

- 1 I read an article that recommended tying up your dog outside in front of your <u>house</u> on Halloween night to keep pranksters away. TERRIBLE ADVICE! Never tie up your dog outside on Halloween night. A dog that is tied up has no way to escape anyone who wants to tease or taunt the poor animal.
- 2 Keep a close eye on all the candy and chocolate that is in <u>your house</u>. Chocolate is not good for dogs and can kill them if the dose is high enough.
- 3 When trick or treaters come to your house make sure your dog is secure and won't run out the door when it is open. Using a different room, using a baby gate and teaching your dog the stay command are all ways that you can deal with this.
- 4 If this is your dog's first Halloween, check to see if your dog is nervous around <u>costumes</u>. Some dogs will get scared from the big wigs and weird masks that people are wearing. It's a good idea to find out about this before the big night.
- 5 Bring your dog inside on Halloween night. Pranksters are out and they can and do tease dogs that are left outside. It is much safer for your dog to be inside.
- 6 Make sure that your dog has on up-to-date Identification tags in case your dog gets loose. Also make sure your dog has all of his current vaccinations.
- 7 Keep the number for the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center handy. The number is (888) 426-4435.

# How to Host a Dog Halloween Party

If you want Halloween to go to the dogs, then you've come to the right place. Read on for instruction on how to throw a dog Halloween party that will have all your favorite four-legged friends having a howling good time.

### Instructions

- 1 <u>Treat</u> it like a theme party. Obviously, your party theme is both Halloween and dogs. Use invites that coordinate with your decorations and general feeling of your party. Ideas include images of doggie bones, paws, pumpkins or another more common Halloween icon.
- 2 Pick a venue for your dog Halloween party, probably in a big backyard with a fence. This helps keep clean-up easy and also helps keep things civil if a couple of your guests get out of hand. If you want to have your party inside, keep the number of guests down, provide quick access to the outdoors and have clean-up supplies on hand.
- 3 Serve refreshments. At the minimum, have some dog <u>treats</u> on hand and a number of full water bowls. Some bakeries specialize in baking cakes and other treats just for dogs and made from dog-friendly ingredients. Make sure you have food for the people, too.
- 4 Include activities for both the people and the dogs. Consider having a puppy parade, a costume contest, a trick contest or variations of fetch. Be sure to let the dogs have some unstructured playtime, as well.
- 5 Designate someone that isn't dog-handling to be the photographer or videographer, and take lots of photos. Send copies to pet owners after the party. It will make a great party souvenir.
